Chapter 2.30 – CHIEF OF POLICE

2.30.050 – Recordkeeping Duty

The chief of police shall keep a record of all duties by the members of the police force, the name of the attending officer, the action taken and the result obtained. He or she shall make an annual report of such record at the first regular meeting of each year, or when requested by the village board.

Recently, based on unfortunate demand, he has been teaching officers, first responders, and civilians how to effectively respond to active shooter threats. He brings all these assets to our community and will work with a hands-on approach in keeping the Village strong and protected.

He was previously employed by the Sheboygan County Sheriff's Office Patrol Division as a 1st Shift Lieutenant and Shift Commander. In that role he guided officers as they worked to be competent and professional law enforcement officers, a skill which he will carry over and implement in Kohler as your Police Chief.



SERVICE CALLS EXPLANATIONS

ASSISTS

Assist calls can include a wide variety of different types of calls. Some of them include:

- Assisting lost semi drivers through the village.
- · Assisting drivers with disabled vehicles.
- Assisting neighboring law enforcement agencies either as a cover officer, with debris in roadways, or at accident scenes.
- Assisting the fire department.
- Assisting the clerk's office with delivering packets to village board members.
- Assisting pedestrians called in by concerned citizens that are walking on highways. Rides are provided to a safe location, if accepted.

DIRECTED PATROL

Directed Patrol calls can consist of the following types of calls:

- Foot patrol at businesses throughout the village. This includes the Shops at Woodlake and Deertrace Shopping Center.
- Assisting with traffic control for all the organized runs and special events held throughout the village.
- Performing monthly street light checks in hours of darkness for the Department of Public Works and informing them which lights are out.
- · Monitoring drills at the Kohler Schools.
- Monitoring the flow of traffic during construction.

PROPERTY CHECKS

We work diligently throughout the year making sure that the residences and businesses are secure. Our efforts include:

- Performing house checks requested by village residents for when they are out of town.
- Performing nightly business checks which include the school, churches, and banks.



EMS CALLS

In addition to functioning as a law enforcement agency, the department functions as an Emergency Medical Service too. The Department is a State of Wisconsin licensed First Responder Level, EMS Provider. Every KPD Officer is either a State Certified First Responder or a State Licensed Emergency Medical Technician. Every KPD Officer is also certified by the American Heart Association in CPR/AED.

The KPD Officers take the additional responsibility seriously and train hard to keep their medical skills sharp and are happy to provide this service to the residents and visitors of the Village of Kohler.

When needed, we rely on our public safety partners for assistance during traffic accidents to get the roadways clear and back to normal traffic flow as quickly as possible.



MAJOR EVENT — MULTI-FATALITY MOTOR VEHICLE CRASH

On January 18th at 11pm Kohler Police and Fire Department Units along with Orange Cross Paramedics were dispatched to Interstate 43 SB just south of CTH PP in the Village of Kohler regarding a one vehicle crash. Upon arrival, KPD Officers found that a southbound vehicle had left the roadway and struck a tree. Officers found the vehicle contained four occupants, two of which were deceased.

The roadway was snow covered and slippery at the time of the crash. Interstate 43 remained open throughout the incident. None of the occupants were from Sheboygan County.

Assisting at the scene were the Sheboygan County Sheriff's Department, the Sheboygan Falls Police Department and Fire Departments, and the Sheboygan County Medical Examiner's Office.

Officer Adam Schmitz, Officer Chad Gross, and Administrative Assistant Jodie Kuklinski were presented with Certificates of Excellence for their performance in regards to this crash. They earned the awards due to their hard work regarding the initial response, the follow-up investigation, and the administrative support regarding the crash.

The Kohler Police Department would like to thank everyone for their assistance with this incident. Although already done in person, we'd also like to express our deepest condolences to the victim's families involved.



MAJOR EVENT -

BEST BUY FIRE

On March 13th at 10:39pm the Sheboygan County 911 Center received a witness report as well as an alarm of smoke at the Best Buy store. Kohler Police Officers and a Sheboygan County Deputy Sheriff arrived nearly immediately and confirmed that smoke was coming through the roof and that the windows were blackened by smoke and soot.

The Kohler Fire Department arrived shortly thereafter and made entry into the building and found an active working fire. Numerous other surrounding fire departments were requested to assist via Sheboygan County's MABAS System of mutual aid.

The fire was deemed under control at 12:35am on March 14th and all units cleared the scene at 2:35am.



MAJOR EVENT -**MARCH FLOODING**

The village experienced flooding on March 14th where there were widespread road closures throughout the county. The combination of warmer temperatures and snow melt, rainfall, frozen ground, and ice jams created flooding throughout the village.

There was significant flooding at the intersection of Treehouse Parkway and Woodland Road where local residents couldn't get to or from their residences.

MAJOR EVENT — HOUSE FIRE ON SCHOOL ST

On April 2nd at 11:50am the Sheboygan County Communications Center received a 911 call from a resident in the 600 block of School Street reporting that a bathroom in their residence was on fire.

Kohler Police Officers and Sheboygan County Sheriff's Deputies arrived within a couple of minutes and observed smoke and flames coming from one of the bathroom walls. Handheld fire extinguishers were used in an attempt to stop the fire from spreading.

Kohler Fire Department personnel arrived and found an active working fire. The fire extended into surrounding walls. An aggressive attack stopped the fire from spreading any further. During this time, fire crews were also able to rescue several family pets.

Agencies assisting the Kohler Fire Department included the City of Sheboygan Falls Fire Department, the Town of Sheboygan Fire Department, the Haven Fire Department, and Orange Cross Ambulance Paramedics. In addition to the Kohler Police Department and the Sheboygan County Sheriff's Department, the City of Sheboygan Falls Police Department also assisted with traffic control.



MAJOR EVENT — KPD Assists with High Speed Pursuit

On April 27th the Kohler Police Department assisted the Sheboygan County Sheriff's Department who requested assistance with a pursuit northbound on I-43 at CTH V at speeds of 115 mph. There were no other deputies in the area.

As the chase went through Kohler on I-43, Officer Schmitz joined as the second unit and took over radio communications per protocol. Officer Schmitz continued to assist until the suspect crashed and was ultimately taken into custody. Though the suspect blew out a tire during the chase, he continued on the rim only at speeds of up to 70mph. The vehicle struck a squad, a tree, and two parked vehicles. The subject refused to cooperate and was pepper sprayed and taken into custody. No one was injured.

The Sheboygan County Sheriff's Department requested charges of Fleeing an Officer, Hit and Run Attended Vehicle, OWI, Resisting Arrest, and Possession of THC.





MAJOR EVENT -

KOHLER MEMORIAL THEATRE TRANSFORMATION

Over the course of 2019, the Kohler Memorial Theatre has been transformed into a more comfortable and gracious space for guests and performers.

The transformation includes some of the following:

- New roomier seats
- Larger lobby with dedicated will call and concession spaces
- Enlarged proscenium arch size for increased audience viewing and diversity of talent
- ADA accessible restrooms with family/private restroom
- 10 wheelchair seats with swing arms on select aisle seats to allow easier access
- Hearing assistance devices
- Push button door activation
- ADA accessible ramp at the front of the theater

The village residents and guests will be able to enjoy this newly remodeled facility for many years to come!







MAJOR EVENT — INVADING PRIVACY ARREST

The Kohler Police Department arrested a party on May 30th who has been in custody since. Since the arrest, our department has worked very hard on this case. We have executed search warrants, took a voluminous amount of evidence into our custody, and conducted many interviews.

We worked very closely with the District Attorney's Office on many aspects of this case. The case consumed the attention of our entire department. Officer Chad Gross was assigned as the lead investigator. However, every officer pitched in - from assisting Chad directly to covering Chad's road shifts to allow him the flexibility to work the case. This clearly is one of the largest cases that our department has ever investigated.

The suspect was charged with multiple counts of Invasion of Privacy and Capturing an Intimate Representation without Consent.



MAJOR EVENT — LAW ENFORCEMENT TORCH RUN

On June 6th we participated in the Law Enforcement Torch Run where we support Special Olympics.

Our leg of the run started in Sheboygan. Everyone came to the Kohler Police Department where Officer Matt Hocevar jumped in. The group ran or biked to Sheboygan Falls PD, then Plymouth PD, then Elkhart Lake PD before caravanning to Stevens Point for the Special Olympics Opening Ceremony.

The mission of the Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics Wisconsin is to raise funds for and awareness of the Special Olympics movement. Special Olympics is a program which reaffirms our beliefs that with hope and dedication, we can see achievement and self-worth realized by any individual. It is our belief that persons with intellectual disabilities, by their involvement in Special Olympics, show the community at large there are no limits to human potential or the human spirit.







MAJOR EVENT — FATAL ACCIDENT

On October 5th at approximately 8:15pm, the Kohler Police Department responded to a one vehicle crash on Highland Drive south of STH 23. Upon arrival, it was found that a southbound pickup truck had traveled from the traffic lane, over the curb, and onto a grass median where it struck a tree.

Despite lifesaving efforts, the sole occupant and operator of the vehicle was declared deceased at the scene. Excessive speed and intoxicant consumption were potential factors in the cause of the crash.

Assisting at the scene was the Sheboygan County Sheriff's Department, Orange Cross Ambulance, Kohler Fire Department, and the Sheboygan County Medical Examiner's Office.

The Kohler Police Department would like to thank everyone for their assistance with this crash. Although already done in person, we'd also like to express our deepest condolences to the victim's family as well.



SNOW EMERGENCIES

During a snow emergency, there is no parking on Village streets and while snow plows are in operation. Vehicles are ticketed by the police department if parked on the street during a snow emergency. Vehicles can park on the street again once a snow emergency has expired.

The Public Works Director has the authority to issue a Snow Emergency and declared two Snow Emergency's in 2019. The Police Department is then tasked with enforcing such. The intent is to allow the Public Works crew to safely and efficiently plow the streets. The Police Department issued a total of 20 parking tickets for interfering with the two snow emergencies this year.

HOUSE CHECKS

The Kohler Police Department continues to provide house checks to any village resident that requests one when they're away for an extended period of time. In 2019, we received 108 requests from village residents.

These house checks don't guarantee that a burglary or other crime will not occur at the residence, but we do provide an extra set of eyes as our schedules allow. Officers will swing by residences and check for suspicious activity. They'll check doors, windows, and drive around. If anything looks suspicious they'll call.

We recommend that residents make every effort to safeguard against losses including securing high value property, locking all doors, and activating alarms if they have them.



COMMUNITY RESOURCE OFFICER (CRO)

Officer Matt Hocevar continues to excel as the Community Resource Officer (CRO). Matt has been working hand and hand with school staff on a daily basis to ensure a safe learning environment for our children. Matt has been a tremendous asset in this partnership since he was re-assigned from general patrol duties in October of 2018.

CRO Hocevar has handled over 70+ incidents where his services were needed in 2019. These calls would normally be assigned to a patrol officer who would need to report to the school to take the complaint. Having a fulltime CRO at the school has eliminated the need to pull a patrol officer off the road to investigate these types of incidents.

CRO Hocevar has done a great job of building a rapport and level of trust with the students making them feel comfortable enough to start reporting incidents to him in person.



Sheboygan Chevrolet kindly donated the use of Officer Matt's Chevrolet Impala.

SCHOOL CRASE TRAINING

On January 29th Officer Hocevar provided school CRASE (Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events) training.

The training is designed and built on the Avoid, Deny, Defend (ADD) strategy developed by ALERRT in 2004. It provides strategies, guidance, and a proven plan for surviving an active shooter event.

Topics covered were the history and prevalence of active shooter events, civilian response options, medical issues, and considerations for conducting drills.

SCHOOL YOUTH & PARENTS WAKE UP CALL

On February 26th Officer Matt Hocevar and Todd Reinemann were at the school representing the department during their Your Choice presentation.

The youth presentation focused on how the choices you make today can affect your future, the importance of choosing the right friends, the hardships and devastation that drugs and alcohol can have on an individual and their family, and the importance of reaching out if they have a problem.

The wake up call presentation reviewed a teen's bedroom with more than 20 "red flags" that can signal drug or alcohol use. Also covered were spots where teens may hide drugs, household items that can be used as drug paraphernalia, and ways teens try to cover up drug and alcohol use.

COUNTERACT

Officer Todd Reinemann has been running the CounterAct Program at the Kohler Schools since 1999. CounterAct Alcohol, Drugs, and Violence is a prevention program designed to bring together schools, families, and police departments to serve as a source of support to encourage children to make healthy behavior choices.

The annual month-long CounterAct session is held at the school and parents, guardians, and other interested adults are invited to attend the final session where the completion of the curriculum is celebrated.

Officer Reinemann looks forward to working with the kids each year and does an excellent job with the program!



GUNLOCKS

The Kohler Police Department continues to supply Masterlock trigger locks for all residents. One free gunlock per year can be obtained from the police department by stopping in.

In addition to the Masterlock trigger locks provided, a federal program, Project Childsafe continues to have locks available. These locks are the cable lock variety and anyone may request these for their guns as well.






PRESCRIPTION DRUG BOX

The Kohler Police Department has a secure drug disposal box in its front lobby entrance that's accessible 24/7 to dispose of all prescription drugs and over the counter medication. The box cannot be used for illegal drugs, needles, syringes, thermometers, or any hazardous materials. The box was obtained through a partnership with Sheboygan County to keep drugs from being flushed down toilets or dumped into landfills.

Many residents utilize the box for old drugs to keep them out of the wrong hands and to be disposed of properly as flushing or throwing out old medications has the potential to harm humans, animals, and the environment.

In 2019, we collected over 32,600 grams of medication.
